From the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education:

Curriculum Summit Materials: In early November, the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education held its 6th Annual Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Summit. The focus of this year's summit was the integration between curriculum and instruction and educator evaluation. The entire summit program focused on using Curriculum Embedded Performance Assessments (CEPA), which are contained in each of the Model Curriculum Units, as a starting place for the development on District-Determined Measures (DDMs). All of the PowerPoint presentations, units, and resources materials from the Summit are now available on the Department's website at http://www.doe.mass.edu/candi/summit/.

The Offices of Tiered System of Support (OTSS) and Special Education Planning and Policy (SEPP) are pleased to announce two professional development opportunities for Massachusetts educators that will begin in the winter/spring semester, 2014. Both opportunities include cost-free, on-line or hybrid graduate courses in a variety of topics that provide educators and related service providers the skills, knowledge and strategies to meet the needs of all students, including those with disabilities, in safe and supportive, inclusive education environments. Both opportunities, the Massachusetts FOCUS Academy (MFA) and the Massachusetts Licensure Academy (MLA) address the DESE's goals to have qualified educators in every public school classroom, to improve student outcomes, and to reduce achievement gaps. In addition, the MLA is specifically designed to assist teachers on waivers for teaching students with disabilities earn licensure, by providing courses that address the seven (7) competencies for the preliminary licensure of Teacher of Students with Moderate Disabilities.

Participants in all of the courses receive 67.5 PDPs upon course completion and also have the option to purchase three (3), graduate level credits at a discounted rate through the partnering Institution of Higher Education (IHE), with which the course instructors are affiliated.

 - Self-Determination, Self-Advocacy and Youth Leadership: Developing the Foundation for Student Success after High School
 - Universal Design for Learning (UDL): Addressing Learner Variability
 - <u>Universal Design for Learning (UDL): Addressing Learner Variability in</u>
 Mathematics Instruction
 - Universal Design for Learning (UDL): Student Affect and Engagement

- 2. The Massachusetts Licensure Academy (MLA) is offering three (3) courses beginning mid January, 2014, as follows:
 - SE1: Federal and State Laws, Educational Terminology and the Role of Other Agencies Pertaining to the Education of Students with IEPs (faceto-face meeting March 29, 2014 at Fitchburg State University)
 - SE2: Assessment for Determination of Education Needs, Curriculum, Services and Programs Including Augmentative and Alternative Communication and Other Assistive Technologies (face-to-face meetings February 22, 2014 and May 3, 2014 at Fitchburg State University)
 - SE3: Mathematics for Special Educators Content and Pedagogy (face-to-face meetings January 18, 2014 and May 18, 2014 at Fitchburg State University)

All of the MFA and MLA courses are open to all current educators in Massachusetts, although there are certain criteria that participants need to meet as outlined in the applications. The concept of a Posse works for both students and college campuses and is rooted in the belief that a small, diverse group of talented students—a Posse—carefully selected and trained, can serve as a catalyst for increased individual and community development.

Mission

Posse started in 1989 because of one student who said, "I never would have dropped out of college if I had my posse with me." The Posse Foundation identifies public high school students with extraordinary academic and leadership potential who may be overlooked by traditional college selection processes. The Foundation extends to these students the opportunity to pursue personal and academic excellence by placing them in supportive, multicultural teams—Posses—of 10 students. The Foundation's partner colleges and universities award Posse Scholars four-year, full-tuition leadership scholarships.

History

Vanderbilt University was Posse's first partner institution and took a Posse of five students from New York City in 1989. Four years after setting foot on Vanderbilt's campus, all five members of Vanderbilt Posse 1 graduated with honors and accolades.

Since then, Posse has sent 4,884 Scholars to top-tier colleges and universities throughout the country. Nationally, Posse Scholars have won \$577 million in

scholarships from Posse's partner institutions and are persisting and graduating at a rate of 90 percent—significantly above the national average.

Three Goals

- 1. To expand the pool from which top colleges and universities can recruit outstanding young leaders from diverse backgrounds.
- 2. To help these institutions build more interactive campus environments so that they can be more welcoming for people from all backgrounds.
- 3. To ensure that Posse Scholars persist in their academic studies and graduate so they can take on leadership positions in the workforce.
