

MHS Mock Trial team makes it to the 'Sweet 16' in statewide battle

On March 3 the Mock Trial made it into the Regionals and took part in the event at Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts. The team ran into a few issues before they were able to make it to the actual event: the buses which the team was supposed to take showed up late forcing them to be over an hour late to their first round of the competition.

However once arriving at the event a coin toss took place which made it so the defense went first the trial went on for little over an hour. The trial was very close however Malden ended up winning with a score of 91 to 88 against Andover.

With the first trial being won the team would progress into the second round of the day known as the Sweet 16. It is referred to as this because there are only 16 teams left in Massachusetts that are still in the competition. This was a very exciting time for the whole team, as Malden made Sweet 16 for the first time ever. The students were ecstatic along with their coach Mr. Tivnan.

That the Malden High School JUNIOR VARIETIES show, which just completed its 79th season is one of the longest, continuous student talent shows in the nation. The OLDEST in the nation, continuos running student talent show is Cony HS (Augusta, ME) "Chizzle Wizzle," which marked its 127th year this school year. It was first held in 1892. Another long-running student show is "Joy Night" at Lincoln HS in Lincoln, Nebraska, which is now in its 93rd year, first shown in 1926.



Malden HS and four other former Greater Boston League schools leaving the Northeastern Conference and reconstituting the GBL with addition of Revere

Two years ago history was made when it was announced the venerable 60-year-old Greater Boston League (GBL) was ceasing operations and the four remaining teams, Everett, Malden, Medford and Somerville were joining the Northeastern Conference (NEC) on a four-year pilot basis.

The addition of the four GBL teams to the NEC made it the largest league in the state, with two eight-team divisions, 16 teams in all.

Recently that history changed when the votes of just five NEC high school principals have led to the breakup and ending of that short-lived merger.

Five schools voted through their principals to end the relationship, one short of a required two-thirds majority, as the numbers were 7-5 in favor of keeping the "GBL teams" in the NEC.

A second vote, by an 11-1 margin, just this past Friday, was made by the NEC to let the "GBL Four" out of their agreement effective at the end of this school year in June, instead of in 2021.

In another twist, Revere High will also leave the NEC and join the "GBL Four" to form, for now, a five-team GBL moving forward this fall. The only added tenet is that Revere will stay a member of the NEC in football only for the 2019 and 2020 seasons.

Voting against the GBL teams, essentially ending the relationship were Beverly, Danvers, Lynn English, Marblehead and Winthrop. The four GBL teams were not allowed a vote, so these five schools ended a 16-team league.

Some of the reasons that unofficially came out of the meetings were "travel time" and "competitiveness

of GBL teams". However, the school with, by far, the longest distance to the GBL schools, Gloucester, voted to keep the GBL teams in the NEC. Gloucester's athletic director Bryan Lafata was quoted in the Gloucester Times newspaper stating that distance between Gloucester and the GBL teams was not a negative factor, nor was any competitive issues of any concern.

"I feel bad for those schools because I felt they met the requirements they asked for them," Swampscott AD Kelly Farley said of Everett, Malden, Medford and Somerville in a Daily Item of Lynn story, said. "They met our expectations."
