BOSTON—Malden High School received an Outstanding Commitment to Greenovation [GREEN + STEM + Innovation] Award at the Annual Green Difference Awards Ceremony at the Massachusetts State House last Friday in recognition of their “Learn and Earn Program.” The Learn and Earn Program, sponsored by a grant from the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center, paid students for a portion of their time

to work and learn about clean energy skills and careers. The final project was construction of a ‘tiny house’ where they applied their knowledge in a physical demonstration of their learning. Superintendent of Schools John Oteri and Mayor Gary Christenson visited Rebecca Corcoran's class at Malden High School recently along with city of Malden Informational Technology (IT) Director Ron Corcoran and Human Services and Senior Center Director Karen Hayes. In conjunction with a Generation Citizen project undertaken by the class, the Mayor and his team members, along with Supt. Oteri, discussed and demonstrated the many ways in which the city and school system strive to make its services

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and programs accessible to members of Malden's diverse population in their native languages.

The Generation Citizen project involves exploring ways to help Malden citizens of various cultures to navigate their way to vital services and assistance despite potential language barriers. Malden is home to the most culturally diverse public high school in Massachusetts and in the top 10 nationally in that category, with an estimated 70 different native languages spoken. Ron Corcoran, who is webmaster for Malden's municipal website,

cityofmalden.org, explained how the entire website is accessible in a variety of languages other than the base English, including Arabic, Chinese, Haitian Creole, Portuguese and Spanish. The Mayor and Karen Hayes told the students in attendance that flyers and other materials that are distributed at the city level and at the Senior Center are also available in multiple languages. In addition, the Mayor told the students that translation services are available and accessible for all Malden residents if they are necessary when they seek municipal services or need assistance from a particular city department. Supt. Oteri explained how the Malden Public School also follows an accessible path as most handouts and messages sent out district-wide to parents are also available in different languages. Also, the Superintendent said that the Malden Public Schools frequently uses a professional translation service to assist parents whenever needed. The Mayor and Superintendent took questions from the class. Most of the questions centered on how students' parents could improve their command of English through classes or other means. Supt. Oteri noted he and his staff has already initiated English classes for parents of Malden Public Schools students this year through the Title III program and that there has been a great response. Students also gave their opinions of some of the city's translation initiatives, including the website, and Ron Corcoran and the Mayor thanked them for the feedback and assured them a review and potential adjustments would follow. The students and Ms. Corcoran were praised for their work on the Generation Citizen project and encouraged to continue to use city and school officials as a resource in pursuing their project goals in the future.

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Generation Citizen is a nationally-recognized organization whose goal is to empower young people through the education system. Their vision statement: Generation Citizen believes every student has the right to learn how to effectively participate as citizens. We inspire civic participation through a proven state standards-aligned action civics class that gives students the opportunity to experience real-world democracy.

Pre-Apprentice Leadership Academy is now under way at Malden High School

Malden Superintendent of Schools John Oteri is pleased to report that Malden High School has signed an agreement with Associated Builders and Contractors, Inc., Merit Apprenticeship Program, to offer pre-apprentice and leadership training. Training for high school graduates will include 75 hours of general construction, OSHA 10, and hoisting training, followed by placement in a job. Classes will be held later this month in the Maker Space at Malden High School in the late afternoon and evening hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays. An additional class will be held on Wednesday evenings for Malden High School seniors beginning in June where students will receive training in OSHA-10 and Construction Math, with the
