On April 13, 2018, the Beebe School participated in our fourteenth annual Earth Day celebration. On that day, the DPW gave demonstrations about the recycling trucks to Kindergarten, 1st Grade, and 2nd Grade. Mr. Dave Smith, an employee of JRM Recycling, did a wonderful job explaining what can and cannot be put into the bins, and also explained what happens to the recycling after it is picked up. Some examples of post recycling were shown including a pencil made from recycled denim jeans! The students were also given activity books to bring home so they could share what they learned with their families.

The 3rd and 6th Grade students were given a demonstration of the city's storm drain truck. Mr. John Desantis and his crew showed the students a map of the sewers in Malden and let them take a look inside the catch basin on Elm St. He also explained the importance of properly disposing of trash so that Boston Harbor can continually improve its cleanliness. (The sewers around the school lead directly to Boston Harbor.)

In addition to the truck demonstrations, grades 1-3 cleaned up the area around the Beebe School, made bird feeders, and planted flowers. Grades 4-8 went to Fellsmere, Devir, Amerige, and Coyetemore Lei Parks, as well as MacDonald Stadium. They participated in a clean up program that equaled a total of 135 hours of labor and netted approximately 35 thirty-gallon trash bags.

Students in 8th grade Spanish Class are studying the Unit about Spain, and famous Spanish artists. Among the most famous is Pablo Picasso and his favorite style of art. "Cubism". (the art that stresses abstract structure). They are studying Picasso's most famous work, Guernica, his most powerful political statement painted in reaction to the Nazi's bombing the town of Guernica during Spanish Civil War.
