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Generation Citizen Project

The Beebe 8th grade has been working on a civics project called GC- Generation Citizen, since November, in our Social Studies class. GC is a non-profit advocacy organization that encourages young people to be more involved with their local community. Each class, or block, created a different project based on what they thought was negatively impacting Malden the most. Block 1 introduced the idea of lowering the voting age; Block 2 introduced the idea of making college more affordable; Block 3 introduced the idea of banning plastic bags and straws; Block 4 introduced the idea of preventing teenagers from vaping and potentially smoking.

Although everyone cooperated together in order to complete each project, representatives were picked from each class to participate in Civics Day at Malden High School on Wednesday, May 1st. Civics Day is where

8th-grade students from all the Malden Public Schools gathered to present their respective projects to both peers and influential figures, such as the City Councilors and Mayor Gary Christenson. During Civics Day, the students were asked to divide into pairs; one pair would visit other presentations and question them, while another would stay behind with their project. The inquiries would allow the group remaining at their project to practice their confidence in answering questions and presenting in front of others.



This happened throughout the MHS gallery with every group, allowing everybody to prepare for when they were in a conference with the Mayor and City Councilors. Some groups had gone above and beyond and included petitions to gather support for their cause; which students and adults alike signed when they visited the particular project.

Everyone from each block worked hard in order to make the project as best as they could make it in such a small period of time, but there were more that have gone above just proposing to the people in the gallery. While the others might have only proposed their concepts at the MHS gallery meeting, Block 3 has made sure

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that their idea is being considered. In December and February, we had met the Mayor and City Council members. During those meetings, we as well as Lana from the Mystic Valley School discussed the topic of plastic bags and straws and how they destroyed our environment. Both the Mayor and the City Council were listening to our requests and had a bill that they were attempting to pass.

Everyone's work paid off, however, because Block 3 and Lana were able to see the bill get passed and Mayor Christensen signing it to become a law.
