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instruments, since most of the students play more than one instrument. First, there was a solo piano piece played by classical pianist Alyssa. She played an Excerpt from Piano Concerto No. 23 Movement 3, by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. The crowd was blown away by her amazing piano talent! Next, There was a duet by Brianna on piano, and Liam on electric guitar. They played Demons, by Imagine Dragons, and the crowd loved it so much, they screamed at the end! Last, the band played two pieces together. One of the pieces, was a Disney Medley which consisted of two songs, "Under the Sea" from The Little Mermaid, and "Circle of Life from The Lion King. This Disney Medley is very special to the 8th grade, because it was specially arranged by their own band teacher, Mr. Weithman. Exploring The History of The Negro Baseball League


