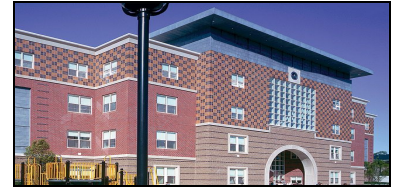

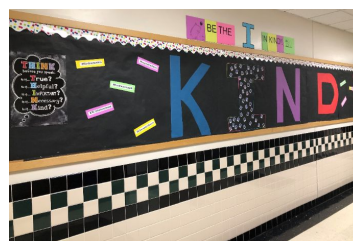
"I would have amazing ninja skills because I heard of these people that defeated many hackers that are trying to delete youtube ." -Kingsley L

Students in Mr. Semple's 2nd and 3rd Grades began their journey into the world of Computer Science by programing a computer code. [Code.org](http://Code.org) challenges students to learn the building blocks to creating video games, widgets, apps and computer engineering projects so that they may find a well paying job in tech one day. This is a Global Event that is translated into over 40 languages for over 61 million students!! Students learn block based coding with a JavaScript translation in the background. 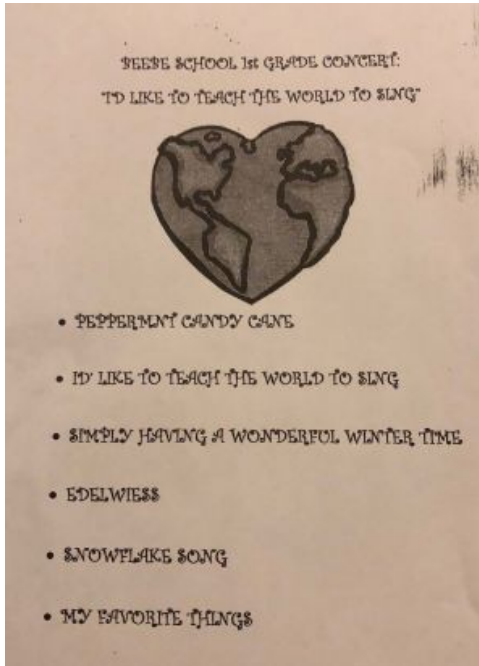


## Be the "I" in Kind!

## First Grade Social/Emotional Exploratory

The first graders have been hard at work learning about feelings and emotions in their social and emotional exploratory. Also, just as important, they have been learning how to regulate those feelings. They are understanding that feelings and emotions can fluctuate during the day and that this is okay. Emotions can cause confusion and stress and it is paramount that students begin to recognize this at an early age. Through the Zones of Regulation curriculum, the first graders are learning about the four zones in which emotions and feelings exist; blue, green, yellow, and red. First graders have been learning to use strategies or tools to stay in a zone or move from one to another. They also have been learning calming techniques, cognitive strategies, and sensory supports and using this toolbox to move from zone to zone. I am super proud of their performance and their willingness to learn about such an important topic that will be beneficial throughout their educational career.
