SUPERINTENDENT

On July 1, 2021, Dr. Noriega-Murphy started her role as Superintendent of the Malden Public Schools. Dr. Ligia Noriega-Murphy holds a Doctorate in Leadership in Education from the University of Salamanca, Salamanca, Spain; a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Study from the University of Massachusetts, Boston; two Master degrees (Education and Management) and a Certificate in Diversity from Cambridge College; a Bachelor of Arts in Art History from the University of Massachusetts, Boston; and a Principalship Residency Network Certification from Northeastern University. Dr. Ligia Noriega-Murphy completed the first Boston Public Schools' Principal Fellows program which was designed to grow school leaders, Principals/Headmasters from within. In 1995, Dr. Ligia Noriega-Murphy began work at the Boston Public Schools. Along with being one of the Boston Arts Academy founding faculty members, she also founded Boston Arts Academy International Program in Spain and Mexico. She served as Assistant Superintendent for Boston Public Schools for 11 years. She is well known for her work in skillfully leading Excel High School and The English High School to high performance levels. In 2013, Dr. Noriega-Murphy was deployed to transform The English High School into a high performing school. In the 2016 Diplomas Now National Convention in Orlando, FL, The English High School and Dr. Noriega received the School and Headmaster of the Year Awards. In 2015 and 2016, Dr. Noriega-Murphy was invited by the White House to present best practices for the national movement of My Brother's Keeper support systems for students. In 2017 Dr. Noriega-Murphy was inducted to The English High School Hall of Fame. Dr. Ligia Noriega-Murphy is fluent in several languages and has traveled to more than 36 countries.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Malden Public Schools is committed to offering the highest quality educational opportunities and needed support to ensure all students succeed. Our goal is to work in partnership with students, family and the community to ensure that each student acquires the knowledge, skills and core values necessary to achieve personal success. We offer a full range of services and programs for our students.

As of October 1, 2022, about 967 students aged K-age 21 with disabilities (15% of total enrollment) are enrolled in special education programs in MPS, of whom:

- •67.4% are educated in fully inclusive settings (spend 80% or more of the school day with their general education peers).
- 6.9% are educated in partially inclusive settings (spend 60% or less of the school day outside of the general education classroom).
- 17.6% are educated in substantially separate classrooms (spend 60% or more of the school day outside of the general education classroom).
- 8.1% are enrolled in special schools in public or private day or residential settings

ENGLISH LEARNERS

Among MPS students in K-grade 12 (as of 10/1/2023):

1445 (22.9%) are Limited English Proficient (LEP) or English Learners (EL)

610 (42%) of EL students were born in the US

All EL students are entitled to receive English as a Second Language (ESL) instruction and core content instruction from highly qualified teachers. Approximate EL enrollment by program, K-grade 12, is:

1445 (100%) in Sheltered English Immersion (SEI)programs (push-in, pull-out, or separate classes)

145 (10%) EL students receive SEI in inclusion or substantially separate programs 545 (38%) EL students in first year in a U.S. School (K-12)

EL students speak more than 35 different languages as their home language. The top seven first languages spoken are Portuguese (48%), Spanish (17%), Chinese (11%), Haitian French creole (9%), Arabic (4%), Vietnamese (3%), and Nepali (2%). MPS students come from 44 different countries, from Afghanistan to Vietnam.

STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT & OUTCOMES

Next-generation MCAS scores fall into four categories: Exceeding Expectations, Meeting Expectations, Partially Meeting Expectations, and Not Meeting Expectations. These categories emphasize readiness for higher-level work at the next grade level. The table below shows the percentage of students who Meet or Exceed Expectations and the change from the 208-19 school year, as compared to the state.

Graduation Rate. The majority of students (87.4%) in the class of 2022 graduated with a regular high school diploma within 4 years. The remaining students are still in high school (4.5%), have earned a GED (0.2%), or have dropped out (7.9%). This rate represents about a 8% increase in the proportion of graduates from the class of 2018 (80%) graduates) and 2019 (79.5%) graduates).

SCHOOL ASSIGNMENTS

All assignments are made according to the student Enrollment Policy and space availability. Students are assigned to schools in the following order:

- Program requirements. For example, students who need special education services are placed into schools that have the needed support.
- 2. Siblings with Proximity Placement. If your new student has a sibling already placed in your neighborhood school, then your new student will be enrolled in that school also.
- Proximity placement. Students are placed in schools closest to their home.

School placements begin July 5. Every effort will be made to accommodate parents/guardians preference within the system of priorities, and the district's educational seating capacity. Parents/guardians may request that their child be placed on a voluntary transfer list for the school by completing a "Voluntary Transfer Form" available at the Welcome Center or on our website: https://maldenps.org/registration
